# THE THINGS I LOVE ABOUT MY COUNTRY-INDIA




The things which I love about my country -India is that it's the place where I was born and is the most suitable place for me to live, grow & prosper.

The human body consists of more bacteria than cells. We have 39 trillion bacteria and 30 trillion human cells.




## 4. Humans are the Only Animals Whose Brain Shrinks!


### 10. The kangaroo mouse never needs to drink water.

# WHAT'S INSIDE? 4500 YEARS PYRAMID MYSTERY



It's been 2000 years since Jesus' birth but Pyramids are the ones which were built even 2500 years back before Jesus's birth.

So, in this article I am going to share mysteries about the Great Pyramid of Giza. Have any one of us ever thought how these pyramids were or who built them?. Why the Egyptians hold a great value for these pyramids or the mysteries behind them?

So, now let's take a time travel and unfold those mysteries.

It doesn't matter how many times you see the Great pyramid it's always astounding, its size, its symmetry and the most impressive is that, it's been here for four and half thousand years. So, let's take a moment and take it in the tomb of the Pharaoh Cheops or Khufu as he is known here. Its completely boggling when we look at it anything what is it, something its sort of really weird!!!

British archaeologist John Romo first saw the Great Pyramid 40 years ago. Ever since like so many others he has been trying to figure out how it was built and the oldest thing in the world just stands there without fearing time.

They are impressive today but imagine the pyramids in ancient times built in limestone with polished sides and completely white, shimmering in the desert. Visitors to this land must have just looked and wondered. The great pyramid is pure perfection, it's not just huge pile of rocks neatly placed on top of each other but it's the precision of the pyramids. Made well before mathematics was recognized, 2000 years before, Pythagoras came up with his triangle theorem. Its perfect angles and joints make this the most precise and most confounding building in the world. It was designed with very simple tools, the naked eye and a piece of string so much of it they used a plumb bob (a string with a weight on the end) and they lined it up to the stars to create one of the most accurate buildings of all the time. 45 centuries later it is still more precise than many modern skyscrapers.

John Romo was the first one who discovered the one-to-one plan of the pyramid mapped out on the Giza Plateau right next to the Great Pyramid. In its steep confined corridors, the tunnels are so narrow because they were not built for access but as control lines for the builders. At the top of the grand gallery is the great step, a big piece of stone smack bang in the middle of the pyramid and to the ancient Egyptians, partway through their constructions prove the pyramid was on track.

There are chances that this great structure got devastated a little due to the earthquakes as we can witness the polished limestone structures to have fallen apart. Archaeological survey confirms that the ancient structure was a polished surface with gold glittering at the top but the recent one is just skeletal remains of the same. These pyramids were built with a total man power of around 20,000 to 30,000 people in a duration of 20 years with a record of the greatest man-made structure for the next 4000 years.

It really puzzles to know that these pyramids can provide such a balance in temperature which even today's modern air conditioners fail to do. However high may be the temperature at the outside of the pyramid, but inside has a constant temperature of 20 degree Celsius. This has been a question to our modern Engineers and architects.

So, now coming to the crux of why such pyramids were built?? As we are all well aware of the Egyptian culture, they had a strong belief about the afterlife. So, the rich and poor as per their abilities would have all their treasures and belongings buried with them. It is theorized the pyramid not only served as a tomb for the pharaoh, but also as a storage pit for various items he would need in the afterlife. The people of Ancient Egypt believed that death on Earth was the start of a journey to the next world.

As the Egyptians were concerned and worried about the grave thieves of those times who would steal the gold and precious valuables of the rich, nobles and pharaohs, they started constructing a slab around the tomb to make it difficult for the thieves to steal. This gradually got evolved into one layer, two layers or multilayers of slabs or blocks. This pyramid structure was initially introduced by the King Sneferu who started building a number of pyramids for his burial. It was later King Khufu who surpassed his father's record (King Sneferu) and built a huge and immense structure known as the Great Pyramid of Giza.

One of the most interesting mysteries that has been unfolded is that the Sarcophagus which contains the precious of the kings, nobles and priests is much bigger than the passage through which it was carried. This proves their architectural excellence.

Till date the great pyramid of Giza holds the record for the tallest structure after the Eiffel tower. We all are aware that this pyramid is built in a desert with no access to any nearby water source. Theories proposed in recent studies suggest that the huge stones for the structure were carried from the Nile River through boats. But till date it remains an unsolved mystery because most of the stones used for the construction of the structure weighed nearly 70 tonnes. Lifting such heavy stones is quite a tremendous work for our modern Engineers, then how was this possible 4500 years ago???

I would now leave to the readers to unfold how the greatest structures of mankind like Taj Mahal, the Brihadishvara Temple of Tanjore and the Great Pyramid of Giza remain a mystery. How such stones were carried???

How were they able to manage such a huge man power?

Tauktae continued intensifying into May 15, reaching severe cyclonic storm status later that day. It affected the states of Kerala, Karnataka, Goa and Maharashtra.

## ✓ COVID-19 Vaccination in India

India began administration of COVID-19 vaccines on 19 January 2021. In India, 91% of the eligible population has received at least one shot, and 67% of the eligible population is fully vaccinated. India initially approved the Covishield vaccine by Oxford and the Covaxin vaccine by Bharat Biotech.

## ✓ India's Achievements at 2021 Tokyo Olympics



## ✓ School Reopening in Maharashtra

Due to Corona Virus, schools have been closed for almost 2 years. At last in the end of 2021, the government of Maharashtra announced the reopening of schools in the state from December 1. The government of Maharashtra took the decision to reopen the schools for classes 1-4 in rural areas and 1-8 in urban areas.



# RETURNING TO THE MOON



Saturn V, Apollo, LEM.....does it sound familiar? If not, allow me to introduce you to possibly the most famous space program ever. The Apollo program was an initiative taken by NASA to get the first human on the moon.

The Apollo Program details were made public in the year 1961 and the actions were immediately taken to get humans to the moon as soon as possible. This was a huge milestone in human spaceflight history. The program looked incredible! Capable of getting humans to the moon and back. The Apollo program did more for us than just get footprints in the moon, but...there was a catch – Budget constraints and safety.

Since the Apollo program was the very first program with the intent on landing a person on another celestial body, we needed to do many things that hadn't been done before. New safety equipment were to be organised, new hardware was to be made accessible, and so on. This added to the cost of the Apollo program. After a few years, the cost had added up to such an extent, that NASA had no other choice but to cancel the Apollo program, which had launched 9 human missions, 6 of which had successfully touched down on the moon. Another factor which affected the sustenance of the Apollo program was safety.

The calculated risks of the Apollo program were 5%. A 5% chance of successfully touching down on the moon, and safely bringing the astronauts back.

Obviously, NASA didn't like those numbers. So, instead of changing the hardware, they decided to change the way they engineered around the risk. Sometimes, that isn't a bad thing. Luckily, it went much more successful than a 5% success rate. The amount of information that we got out of the Apollo program, is ludicrous, and it is still considered the best program as of this day. This is because of budgetary constraints and many other reasons you may or may not know, the Apollo program was cancelled. We haven't gone to the moon since then. Well, we did send some unmanned probes to the moon, but no man has returned to the moon since Apollo 17.

Now we arrive at present-day Florida, where the mighty SLS is being assembled by a dedicated group of engineers. The Space Launch System – SLS for short – is being built with the intent of landing people on the moon again after a gap of about 50 years. This program is called – Artimes, ushering a new era of space exploration to the moon and beyond.

NASA has learned from Apollo and is using this knowledge to perfect Artimes. If all of this is done efficiently, we could be seeing Artimes happen for real by early 2024! Artimes not only promises a more permanent human presence on and around the moon, but also promises to use the moon as a hub for deep-space exploration missions to other celestial bodies, like Mars.





Conclusively, the important lesson this year taught me is that asking for help, learning from others and working upon ourselves leads eventually to success.


